Research

Object of investigation: decorative programme of private tombs and the material culture of the Middle Kingdom Icon


Visual reflections

Study of two-dimensional representations (icons) in relation to

three-dimensional the artefacts (objects) which they were intended to illustrate

Designations

Philological investigation of the accompanying captions and the nomenclature of icons/objects



Crowd sourcing

MEKETREpository – online database for public use, still in progress

Systematic collection of Middle Kingdom private tombs and their decorative programme (plans and images, descriptions, references)

Thesaurus: controlled vocabulary used for the descriptions of icons

Difficulties

- Out-dated and insufficient publications
- Images of poor quality or restricted by copyright

Citizen science approach

Extension of the MEKETREpository by utilising crowd sourcing technologies in order to improve its usability



Upload – new interactive platform

Involvement of interested public and scholars who can provide unrestricted high-quality photographs, annotate the scenes and suggest terms for the Thesaurus

Data of suitable quality will be transferred to the *MEKETRE*pository

- Which artefacts were represented in art and how?
- · Was the development of the material culture reflected in art?
- · Were some artefacts or images of them specific to a particular region or period of time, etc.?
- What were the object designations?
- · Do the designations provide additional information on the objects' nature and their specific features?
- How do depiction and caption complement one another?
- Did icons and designations have a deeper symbolic meaning?
